SINALOPATO DUCK AND DOVE CLUB

Sinalopato Duck and Dove Club is located in Los Mochis Northwest Mexico, on the Sea of Cortez, The Pacific Coast, Sinalopato sits below Hermosillo, Los Mochis population 300,000, 400 miles south of Nogales, Ariz

Besides pintail our hunters will Bag: black-bellied whistling duck, redhead, cinnamon teal, green winged teal, blue winged teal, gadwall, canvasback, fulvous whistling duck, ruddy duck,

Mexican mottled duck, widgeon, northern shoveler, buffle head, pacific black brant, mallard, Scaup, Spreckle belly Goose, bluebill, red shoveler, cape shoveler, Australasian shoveler and golden eye in our marshes.

We are Outfitting pioneers in Sinaloa and over the years have secured the best hunting grounds for our clients. Our reputation in the area has given us access to the prime locations and whether you are floating over the marshlands or driving to a field, you will always experience the difference.



HUNTERS TESTIMONY

Sinalopato has put together a first rate bird hunting operation for 23 species of waterfowl White-winged and mourning dove.

In two trips here five years apart, I found superlative accommodations plus excellent gunning to be surprisingly consistent. Many of Bobby Balderrama's (Sinalopato owner/outfitter), support staff -drivers, guides, restaurant servers, office people and others-have worked for him for years. All speak English: all are well trained and industrious. Much of Balderrama's business is from repeat costumers. Upon arrival at the gated Plaza Inn, a 15 minute shuttle from Los Mochis International Airport, each guest is greeted with a margarita. Hunting parties returning at noon or after dark also receive hors d'oeuvres. A typical day begins at 5 a.m. with a buffet breakfast at Owens, one of two restaurants. Guides are ready to escort hunters to Suburbans or VANS already loaded with guns, ammo and beverage coolers. A drive of 20 to 50 minutes brings the dove hunters



to picked grain fields or mesquite groves in the fertile farming valleys of Los Mochis and El Fuerte for pass-shooting the morning flights. A half hour's drive puts duck hunters into either the Lagoon de Ohuira or Estero de Capoa, lake/marsh matrixes totaling nearly 40,000 acres. Returning at midday, shooters enjoy a bountiful lunch from the full-service menú, nap for an hour or two, and then head out for an afternoon duck or dove hunt. The packages always allow for two hunts spread over a long, full day. The luxurious rooms and suites are especially inviting after evening drinks and a fine meal, which if requested- will include birds shot that morning or the day before.
